Our theme is "Creativity for All" – We plan to explore "How We Teach", "What We Teach" and "What Students Learn".

It is our pleasure to announce our featured presenters will be Akiko and Forrest Kinney – a dynamic husband and wife team from Seattle, Washington. You will enjoy reading more about them in this issue of MMT. The following is a short description of their presentations.

MEET OUR PRESENTERS

AKIKO & FORREST KINNEY!

Akiko Kinney was awarded a Masters of Music Degree in Piano Performance from the University of Washington in 1999. She has an affinity for the music of Bach, and in her final Master's recital performed the complete Goldberg Variations. She was awarded a B.M. Degree in Piano Performance from California State University at Northridge in 1993.

Akiko is interested in the purpose and power of music, and how it can be used to explore and express our highest potentials. She strives to awaken the power of imagination in her students. As part of her quest, she taught the Yamaha Music Education System in Southern California for five years to groups, and taught choir in a Catholic school. She was a certified Suzuki Music Teacher and she still incorporates many Suzuki methods into her teaching of young children.

Akiko gives workshops for teachers with her husband, Forrest. She offers her colleagues practical solutions to teaching creativity, and proof that even a teacher who believes they are not creative can become so!

Forrest Kinney has devoted his life to helping others recognize and express their unique creative potentials. He has taught music to private students for nearly thirty years, teaching them classical literature, technique, composition, arranging, song writing, music theory, and improvisation in all styles. He also frequently gives workshops for music teachers with his wife, Akiko.

Forrest is also a professional pianist and arranger. He has performed thirteen times at the home of Bill Gates, and he also played for the gala dinner at the opening of the Seattle Symphony's Benaroya Hall.

Forrest is an active composer of songs and music for the piano. He is currently notating the 126 World Songs (featuring lyrics from nearly forty countries) that he has composed with Dr. Kevin Helppie, a vocalist teaching at Western Oregon University. The two have performed numerous concerts together, including one completely improvised from phrases supplied by audience members.

Forrest is the author of a series of books on musical creativity called *Pattern Play: Create Your Own Music*. The first book was published in November 2004, and the second will be

published later this year. Over 200 members of the Washington State Music teachers have a copy of the book, and many are actively teaching from it. Forrest has also written a forthcoming book entitled *Creativity—Beyond Compare!* This book dispels most of the popular misconceptions that keep people from feeling the joy of creating.

Conference Theme - Creativity for All

How can we help our students create their own music? Can this be done in a weekly lesson when there is already too much to pack in? Yes.

As an Ute proverb says, "God gives us each our own song." Anyone can learn to create their own music, if only they have the desire, and an approach that allows them.

This workshop offers an enjoyable and natural way to learn how to spontaneously create music at the piano, with or without other instrumentalists. Improvising is not only done in jazz styles! Perhaps the greatest improvisers in history were Bach, Beethoven, and Mozart—their ability to create "on the spot" is legendary.

Our approach is called "Pattern Play" because it consists of learning short musical patterns and then playing (creating) with them. In the Pattern Play way of making music, you learn to create melodies the same way you learned to make sentences. You will develop the same kind of creative powers with tones that you now have with words.

Simple Patterns grow into more complex musical Patterns naturally. At the same time, the common language of musical Patterns will grow into a more private language, able to express something uniquely your own.

More Information on Teaching Technique Through Creativity

As teachers, we all can recognize students who are tense and tentative—there seems to be more of them these days, doesn't there? But how can we help them relax and enjoy playing? How can we help them quit pushing and straining, and help them learn to let gravity do some of the work?

Exercises don't usually work for such students, especially when the student is musically sensitive. Even etudes require students to give so much attention to the score that they can't focus on how their bodies are feeling or responding.

The solution often lies in engaging the musical spirit of the student. For example, while practicing a five-finger Hanonesque pattern can be mechanical and cause strain, practicing the same pattern above a rhythmic two-chord jazz accompaniment or a mellow two-chord accompaniment in Chopin style can make all the difference.
