A Message from Penny Draper

Dear MMTA Members,

It's official... the MMTA gavel - along with a detailed, well-organized notebook - has arrived from our Past President, Adrienne Wiley. The notebook gives me direction and a "recent" historical perspective as I embark in the office of MMTA President. In that regard I am honored and consider it a privilege to serve as president of such an august organization, through which so much has been accomplished in supporting and promoting private music teachers and their students in the state of Michigan for over twelve decades.

A retrospective look at the earliest years in MMTA's history is possible with a visit to the Clarke Historical Library, a state-of-the-art archival facility that houses MMTA records at Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant. The early MMTA scrapbooks in this collection include a program from the first annual meeting, held at the Hibbard Opera House in Jackson on June 30th and July 1st in 1887. Since that year we have now had 125 state conferences; although the years between the first meeting and this last conference don't exactly correspond... it would seem that the 125th conference should have occurred in 2012 if my math is correct.

Disregarding this apparent discrepancy, our 125th conference ran smoothly in 2010, due to the efforts of the local host chapter, the Livonia Area Piano Teachers Forum, whose members volunteered as monitors, at the registration desk, as greeters and in hospitality. A special thanks to the conference co-chairs, Janice Derian and Nancy Whitecar, along with committee members Roy Coloma, Doris Edwards, Ellen Nixon and Charles Schenck, all of whom put in untold hours throughout the spring and summer to ensure that the conference was a success.

Our conference clinician, Martha Hilley, was warm, personable, knowledgeable and a technical whiz! Likewise, international piano artist Leon Bates' Gala Concert performance was inspiring, as he executed a demanding repertoire with technical prowess and a thoughtful sensitivity. Brian Chung, Senior Vice President of Kawai, presented an enthusiastic and inspirational session on improvisation for the classically trained pianist. Our own Diana Munch, along with her sister, soprano Linda Munch, gave us an enlightening historical performance featuring the fortepiano and its role in an ensemble, directly compared to the same on a modern piano.

And the concerts! It was such an inspiration to hear the outstanding performances of our Michigan Youth Winners in the MMTA and MTNA Competitions... pushing the bar up a notch in our own studio expectations. Likewise, the ensemble performances of our Michigan colleagues, namely Kazimierz Brzozowski, Roy Coloma, Christina Dragone, Diana Munch, Kathy Ranus, and duo pianists Yuki and Tomoko Mack, displayed the magic of precision and resulting pure pleasure in listening to four- and eight-hand compositions and arrangements. That same precision was evident in the Oakton Six presentation (six pianos and twelve hands) under the able direction of founder and conductor Glenna Sprague.

In addition to the inspiring sessions and concerts, our MMTA conferences allow us to reconnect with our colleagues in other areas of the state, and I am already looking forward to that opportunity in 2011. The 126th MMTA Conference will be hosted by the Capital Area Music Teachers Association, with Gerardo Ascheri and Elaine Yanz serving as co-chairs. Our new Vice President, Garik Pedersen, brings his wealth of knowledge and ideas to the planning of our next conference, and it promises to be exceptional.

Though I am writing this in the lingering afterglow of the 125th conference, you'll be reading it in the midst of holiday preparations in December. My best wishes for a wonderful holiday season and continued success in your professional endeavors!
