

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
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Conference Artist: Dr. Norman Krieger



Norman Krieger is professor of piano at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music.

A native of Los Angeles, he is one of the most acclaimed pianists of his generation and is highly regarded as an artist of depth, sensitivity, and virtuosic flair. He previously served as professor of keyboard studies at the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music since 1997.

Zubin Mehta, Marin Alsop, Myung-Whun Chung, Miguel Harth-Bedoya, JoAnn Falletta, Jeffrey Kahane, Donald

Runnicles, Leonard Slatkin, Michael Tilson Thomas, Keith Lockhart, Jaap van Zweden, and Carl St. Clair are just a few of the conductors with whom Krieger has collaborated.

Krieger regularly appears with the major orchestras of North America, among them the New York, Los Angeles, Buffalo, Dayton and Rochester Philharmonics, the Minnesota Orchestra, Boston Pops Orchestra, National Symphony, Pacific Symphony, and the Symphony Orchestras of Austin, Baltimore, California, Chicago, Cincinnati, Columbus, El Paso, Florida, Grand Rapids, Hartford, Honolulu, Indianapolis, Jacksonville, Kansas City, Long Beach, Milwaukee, New Haven, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oregon, Phoenix, Pittsburgh, Richmond, Saint Louis, San Antonio, San Diego, San Luis Obispo, Santa Fe, Santa Rosa, Spokane, Stockton, Syracuse, and Virginia, among others, as well as Mexico's Orquesta Filarmónica de la Ciudad de México and Orquesta Sinfónica de Xalapa.

Abroad, he has been guest soloist with Germany's Philharmonisches Orchester Augsburg, Holland's Orkest van het Oosten, Prague's Czech National Symphony Orchestra, Turkey's Presidential Symphony Orchestra, New Zealand's Auckland Philharmonia, Taiwan's National Symphony Orchestra, the Shanghai Symphony, and the Hong Kong Philharmonic. In September 2014, he recorded the Brahms Piano Concerto No. 2 with the London Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Philip Ryan Mann.

In recital, Krieger has appeared throughout the United States, Europe, Mexico, and Asia, while chamber music collaborations have included appearances with sopranos Beverly Hoch and Sheri Greenawald, cellists Jian Wang and Zuill Bailey, and the Tokyo and Manhattan string quartets. His debut at New York City's prestigious Carnegie Hall and Mostly Mozart Festival earned him an immediate invitation to Lincoln Center's 2005-06 Great Performers Series.

In 1987, Krieger made headlines by being named the Gold Medal Winner of the first Palm Beach Invitational Piano Competition. Earlier, in 1984, he earned selection to the distinguished roster of Affiliate Artists, where he participated in the Xerox Pianists Program from 1984 to 1986. He is also the recipient of the Paderewski Foundation Award, Bruce Hungerford Memorial Prize, Victor Herbert Memorial Prize, Buffalo Philharmonic Young Artists Competition Prize, and Saint Louis Symphony Prize.

Krieger's first piano teacher was his uncle, Rudy Hadda. Later training began in Los Angeles under the tutelage of Esther Lipton. At age 15, he became a full-scholarship student of Adele Marcus at The Juilliard School, at which he earned both bachelor's and master's degrees. Subsequently, he studied with Alfred Brendel and Maria Curcio in London and earned an Artist Diploma from the New England Conservatory, where he worked with Russell Sherman. A champion of contemporary music, he features the music of John Adams, Leonard Bernstein, John Corigliano, Daniel Brewbaker, Donald Crockett, Judith St. Croix, Lukas Foss, and Lowell Liebermann among his active repertoire.

Krieger's solo recordings include five albums available on the Artisie 4 label: Norman Krieger: Transformations, comprised of Liszt's two piano concertos and his Totentanz, with the Prague Radio Orchestra; Gershwin in Prague, including "Rhapsody in Blue" and Concerto in F, with the Prague National Symphony Orchestra, and Tomas Svoboda: Piano Concertos with the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra, both under the baton of Neal Gittleman; Norman Krieger: Piano Recital, with music by Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, and Chopin; and American Piano Concertos, featuring works by MacDowell and David Wiley with the Roanoke Symphony Orchestra conducted by Wiley.

Krieger's chamber music collaborations include Raising the Roof, an album of chamber music by Haydn, Bloch, Bruch, and Martinů (Artisie 4); The Prince Albert Chamber Music Festival, including works by Barber, Beethoven, Bizet, Chopin, Schubert, and Tchaikovsky (Artisie 4); Voices Through Time, works of Brahms and Schubert with flutist Emily Skala (Summit); and Summerdays, music of Barber, Berg, Bernstein, Gershwin, Glazunov, Lehár, and Mozart, from the Musical Masterworks Festival at Old Lyme (Well-Tempered).

In 2013, he performed Gershwin's Piano Concerto with the New West Symphony, Beethoven's Concertos Nos. 4 and 5 with the Dayton Philharmonic and Ravel's Concerto for the Left Hand with the Brevard Music Center Orchestra. He regularly gives master classes around the world.

Krieger is the founding artistic director of The Prince Albert Music Festival in Hawaii. Since 2008, he has served on the summer faculty at the Brevard music festival in North Carolina.

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Conference Clinician: Dr. William H. Chapman Nyaho



William H. Chapman Nyaho is a Ghanaian American concert pianist specializing in solo piano music by composers from Africa and the African diaspora.

He graduated from the Achimota School in Achimota, where he studied piano with John Barham. He holds B.A. and M.A. degrees in music from St Peter's College, Oxford University, an M.M. from the Eastman School of Music, and a D.M.A. from the University of Texas at Austin. He has also studied at the Conservatoire de Musique de Genève. He has taught at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, Colby College and Willamette

University. He currently teaches privately and performs nationally and internationally giving recitals, masterclasses and workshops.

His repertoire includes music by Gamal Abdel-Rahim, Margaret Bonds, Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, Robert Nathaniel Dett, Halim El-Dabh, Coleridge-Taylor Perkinson, Gyimah Labi, and Joshua Uzoigwe. He has performed throughout the U.S., Canada, and Europe, as well as in China.

He has compiled and edited a five-volume anthology Piano Music of Africa and the African Diaspora published by Oxford University Press.

He lives in Seattle, Washington.



Conference Clinician: Dr. Heather Nelson Shouldice



Heather Nelson Shouldice, associate professor of music education, teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in music education, supervises student teachers and serves as coordinator of the music education program at EMU. She also serves as faculty advisor for EMU's collegiate chapter of the National Association for Music Education and directs the early childhood music program through the EMU Community Music Academy. During her doctoral studies, Dr. Shouldice was a recipient of MSU's prestigious Excellence-in-Teaching Citation and also was awarded a Leadership Endowment Fellowship from the MSU Council of Graduate Students and a Dissertation Completion Fellowship from the MSU Graduate School.

Prior to arriving at EMU, Dr. Shouldice taught elementary general music in Michigan public schools for 8 years, and she continues to teach early childhood music classes, which she has been doing for over 15 years. She has presented workshops and conference sessions for music educators across the country on topics such as early childhood music, effective sequencing of instruction, music literacy, improvisation and composition in the elementary music classroom. Dr. Shouldice is currently serving as president of the Gordon Institute for Music Learning (GIML) and also serves as a GIML faculty member, teaching summer professional development courses on music learning theory for music educators.

Dr. Shouldice's research interests include music teacher beliefs and their relationships to teaching practice, music teacher identity development and musical development and musical identity in young children. Her research and writing have been published in the Bulletin of the Council for Research in Music Education, Research Studies in Music Education, Music Education Research, Journal of Research in Music Education, Journal of Music Teacher Education, GIML Audea, Michigan Music Educator, and Antiphon: The Magazine of the Arizona Chapter American Choral Directors Association. Dr. Shouldice has presented her research at the Suncoast Music Education Research Symposium, the Desert Skies Symposium on Research in Music Education, the Symposium on Music Teacher Education, the NAfME Music Research and Teacher Education Conference, the Instrumental Music Teacher Educators Colloquium and the MMEA Research Symposium.


David Keep

His research focuses on Brahms, musical meaning, and the connections between analysis and performance.

Heather Vedder has been teaching private piano lessons for twenty years and received her Bachelor of Music in Keyboard Pedagogy from Cedarville University. She is Nationally Certified through MTNA and has presented at the Washington State Music Teachers Conference. Currently, she serves as the Capital Area Music Teachers Association's Corresponding Secretary. 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2021 Commissioned Composer – Stephen Mitton



Stephen Mitton (b. 1991) is a composer, performer, and educator based in Ann Arbor, Michigan. He is currently pursuing his Doctorate in Music Composition at the University of Michigan where he has studied composition with Bright Sheng and Michael Daugherty. Stephen also holds a Master's degree in Music Composition from Arizona State University where he studied with Jody Rockmaker, James DeMars, and Rodney Rogers. Stephen has written socially and environmentally conscious music for a wide variety of genres ranging from contemporary dance to full orchestra. He


is the recipient of numerous awards and grants and was most recently named MMTA's Commissioned Composer for the year 2021. He has received commissions from various performers across the country, as well as several groups and organizations including Winona State University, Chicago Public Schools, the Arizona State University Bands and Orchestras, the Arizona State University BioDesign Institute, and the Arizona Flute Society.

In his compositions, Stephen aims to grab audiences' attention by generating short, memorable motifs and melodies that serve an overarching narrative or concept and is intrigued by the possibilities that open up when a variety of harmonic languages converge to this end: lush tonality interspersed with harmonies built on open fourths and fifths; Debussian flourishes juxtaposed with twelve-tone rows. His music is frequently centered on exploring the mental landscapes where memories, dreams, and obscure emotions overlap, often working with concepts like nostalgia, liminality, and the development or perception of one's sense of self as time passes. Mitton is also deeply engaged in music about humankind's impact on the environment and the Earth's immense biodiversity, having written music about plastics pollution in the oceans and wildlife conservation, among similar topics.

Stephen is also an active performer, with a bachelor's degree in cello performance from Utah State University where he studied chamber music with the Fry Street Quartet. He has participated in master classes with such groups as the Emerson, Ying, and Brentano String Quartets, and has given well-received performances throughout the country. As an educator

and pedagogue, Stephen has taught music at both the K-12 level and the collegiate level for over a decade, having held teaching appointments at Utah State University, Arizona State University, BASIS Charter Schools, and the University of Michigan. Much of Stephen's current work centers on championing emerging composers by facilitating commissioning projects with local ensembles and school districts through his publishing company, Leading Tones Music.

Liminal Spaces

Stephen Mitton

From the composer:

Liminal Spaces are sometimes defined as the physical spaces between one destination and the next, including places like stairwells, hallways, etc., but they are so much more than that. They include places like airports and hotel rooms; they include the spaces between childhood and adulthood, dating and marriage, finishing coursework and graduation; and yes, even the odd space between "pandemic life" and "normal life" during which the bulk of this piece was written. I have been thinking a lot about liminality. We all experience inbetween spaces. They can be uncomfortable and awkward. They can be spooky (especially if one is or feels alone); but they can be incredibly beautiful, challenging us to grow and bringing out a vast range of emotions—intense nostalgia, deep longing, fear, and inexpressible joy. In this piece, composed in three distinct sections, I chose to embrace all definitions of liminality and the feelings evoked, celebrating the suggestion of constant motion in the in-between spaces that makes us who we are as we cross thresholds of time, space, and awareness.

The Performers

Among them: The Chopin International Hartford, Musicale Romantic Competition and International Rocky Mountain Competition. Ethan also won the third place award for the MMTA State Solo Competition in 2021. 

National Audition of the Astral Artists


Roster. The most reputable foundations in

2020 Distinguished Service Award Recipient Adrienne Wiley



Adrienne Wiley is currently Professor of Music at Central Michigan University where she teaches and administers the piano pedagogy program at the bachelor's degree level, and teaches class piano. Dr. Wiley received her bachelors and master's degrees in piano performance from the University of Kansas, and her doctor of musical arts in piano performance and pedagogy from the University of Oklahoma. Dr. Wiley's dual focus on performance and pedagogy keeps her active in both areas: she maintains an active performance career as a soloist and collaborative pianist, and also has given

workshops, presentations, and lectures throughout the state, mid-west, national, and international levels.

Dr. Wiley is certified through the Music Teachers National Association at the state and national levels. She has served MTNA (national level) in many capacities: most notably the Local Associations Awards Chair, the MTNA Senior Performance Competitions Chair, and other select committees. Currently she is the East Central Division Competitions Coordinator for the MTNA Competitions. She has been active in the Michigan Music Teachers Association as well, holding various offices since she came to Michigan.

Dr. Wiley received the nomination for Teacher of the Year for the MTNA national level (2013); received the Teacher of the Year Award from the Michigan Music Teachers Association (2013); and received the Touchstone Award (2014) through the Michigan Music Teachers Association and the Michigan Youth Arts Council. In her spare time, Dr. Wiley has authored articles that have appeared in the American Music Teacher Magazine, Keyboard Companion, Clavier magazines, and the Clavier-Companion (Clavier and Clavier-Companion are now Piano Magazine). Wiley reviewed the book, One-Handed: A Guide to Piano Music for One Hand for the Journal of the Music Library Association. In addition, she is a frequently invited reviewer of piano music and books for the Music Teachers National Association's American Music Teacher magazine and Piano Magazine, and recently joined Piano Magazine as a staff reviewer.

Dr. Wiley has been invited to present at the International Society of Music Education in Brazil, 2014, Glasgow, Scotland, 2016, and at the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers National Conference in Canada, 2015 and 2019 and the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, 2019. She has presented for the College Music Society at the state, regional, and national levels, as well as the Music Teachers National Association Conferences.

Summer finds Dr. Wiley as the coordinator of the junior piano camps at the Illinois Summer Youth Music Program's piano camp, where she has been on the ISYM teaching faculty for over 14 years. In addition, she devotes her spare time to her favorite topic: one-handed piano music: she has written articles on the topic, delivered workshops at the state, mid-west, national and international levels.

Many of her students have


completed the highest level of testing in the MMTA-SAT exam. She keeps her students busy with recitals, exams and competitions.
