Peter Mack, NCTM, President Music Teachers National Association



MTNA President Peter Mack is a nationally renowned performer, clinician and convention artist. Originally from Ireland, he now lives in Seattle, Washington, where he runs a successful private studio. He was professor of piano at Cornish College for 33 years.

A choral scholar at Trinity College Dublin, Peter received his master's degree from the University of Cincinnati and his doctorate from the University of Washington. His students frequently win local, national and even international competitions. Peter is the proud teacher of 20 MTNA Competition national finalists and of three MTNA national first-place winners. He has written for *Keyboard Companion*, the *Clarion* and *American Music Teacher*.

For MTNA, Peter served on the national board as vice president (2017–2019) and as Northwest Division director (2010–2012). He chaired the planning committee for the 2014 Chicago National Conference, coordinated Pedagogy Saturday for the 2012 New York Conference and has led the Artistry Track multiple times. The 2015 Las Vegas conference saw him honored as a surprise MTNA FOUNDATION Fellow. For Washington State, he has served as district vice president (organizing two district conferences), education board member (two five-year terms), and adjudicator chair (organizing two adjudicator conferences). Peter is currently Washington State's Foundation chair and serves on its nominating committee. He is especially honored to administer the state's needy student MAP subsidy program. Peter has adjudicated for Washington's amazing MAP/adjudications program for 23 years.





Gary L. Ingle, Executive Director and CEO, Music Teachers National Association

Founded in 1876, MTNA is the oldest music teacher association in the United States. Currently headquartered in Cincinnati, Ohio, MTNA is a professional organization of 20,000 studio music teachers who teach in independent and collegiate settings worldwide. MTNA's mission is to advance the value of music teaching and music making to society and to support the professionalism of music teachers.

As a part of his role at MTNA, Ingle serves as President and CEO of the American Classical Hall of Fame. Also with offices in Cincinnati, Ohio, the Hall of Fame was acquired by MTNA in December 2017 to manage and oversee its programs and operations. As a subsidiary of MTNA, the Hall of Fame recognizes artists, composers, educators, and organizations that have made significant and lasting contributions to Classical Music in America and to American Classical Music.

Ingle holds multiple volunteer leadership positions in organizations throughout the world. He currently serves as president and chairman of the board of the National Music Council of the United States (NMC). Founded in 1940 and chartered by the 84th U.S. Congress in 1956, the NMC acts as a clearing house for the joint opinion and decision of its 47 member organizations and is dedicated to strengthening the importance of music in the life and culture of the United States. In this role, he represents the NMC to the International Music Council, headquartered in Paris.

Ingle also serves as president of the Music Council of the Three Americas (COMTA), one of five regional councils of the International Music Council. COMTA represents musical organizations across North, Central and South America, fostering understanding, cooperation and interaction among its various cultures and citizens.

After completing six years as chair of the Forum for Instrumental and Vocal Pedagogy of the International Society for Music Education (ISME) In July 2018, he now serves as a special advisor to the group. The mission of the Forum is to inform the work of studio instrumental and vocal music teachers around the world who provide individualized or group instruction in keyboard, wind, string and percussion instruments, and voice.

Ingle is a member of the Advisory Board of *From the Top*, the public radio program dedicated to encouraging, supporting and celebrating the commitment of young people to music and the arts. He is on the Advisory Board of the Chopin Foundation of the United States and the Editorial Advisory Board for the magazine *Making Music: Better Living Through Recreational Music Making*, a publication devoted to the health and wellness benefits of music making. From 1998 until 2012 he served on the Board of Trustees of the American Classical Music Hall of Fame, during which he held the position of Secretary of the Board from 2000–2003, was the Chair of the Professional Organizations Advisory Council, and was a member of its National Artistic Council.

A frequent speaker and panelist, Ingle has given addresses in all 50 states as well as to music groups in Canada, the United Kingdom, China, Eastern and Western Europe, South America and Africa, including the International Society for Music Education, the European Music Teachers Association, the International Music Council, the Music Council of the Three Americas, the National Association of Schools of Music, NAMM: The International Music Products Association, the College Music Society, Piano Technicians Guild, the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers Associations, the Global Summit of the Music Products Industry, the Music Publishers Association, among others.

Widely regarded for his advocacy efforts for music study in all its settings, Ingle has been interviewed on numerous TV and talk radio programs across the United States. He was featured on the award-winning television program *Profile Series* for a segment on music education in the United States. Hosted by the Oscar winning actor Lou Gossett, Jr., the *Profile Series* is dedicated to showcasing the most important issues of the day, from the latest business and technology stories, to revolutionary medical and health issues, to current educational break-throughs. Ingle's message that music study with a qualified music teacher is for everyone was broadcast over such channels as Bravo, Lifetime, CNN, Fox News and Voice of America. In 2007, Ingle was featured on Sky Radio, the in-flight information and entertainment channel, which was broadcast on all Northwest and American Airlines flights for a three-month period. His segment encouraged adults to take music lessons for musical, social and health reasons.

Prior to his December 1996 appointment to MTNA, Ingle was executive director of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Music Fraternity in Evansville, Indiana. At Phi Mu Alpha, he was responsible for the fraternity's work with more than 200 collegiate chapters across the country, as well as the activities of the Sinfonia Foundation of America.

Ingle's academic career spanned 10 years with Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar, Missouri. During his tenure, he attained the rank of full professor of music and served as chair of the Department of Music, later as dean of the Casebolt School of Fine Arts, and ultimately as Vice President for Enrollment Management. As a conductor, he directed his choirs on four international tours: to continental Europe, to Great Britain, and two tours to the Far East. While in Asia, his choirs sang for the Far East Broadcasting Company and in Olympic Stadium in Seoul, South Korea.

Ingle is listed in the International Who's Who in Music, Who's Who in America, Outstanding Young Men of America, Community Leaders and Noteworthy Americans, the Dictionary of International Biography and other prominent biographical resources.

A native of Birmingham, Alabama, Ingle holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree with emphases in conducting, voice and higher education administration from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in music at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama. Additional studies include the Cumberland School of Law in Birmingham.

Sungyeon Ahn and Jiwoon Sim, Michigan State University Collegiate Chapter, and Derek Kealii Polischuk, D.M.A.

"Many Hands: Music by Women for Piano Four Hands" Women Composers have been undeservedly neglected in the canon of classical music for hundreds of years. We will present two works by Cécile Chaminade (1857-1944) and Marie Jaëll (1846-1925) as works that deserve a place amongst the greatest works for piano four hands.

Svetlana Belsky, D.M.A.

"Tchaikovsky's Children's Album: The Light of a Dark Soul"

The 24 delightful miniatures of Tchaikovsky' *Children's Album* are a perfect pedagogical tool for introducing students of all ages to elements of romantic technique and sound production. For the adults and the teachers, these works are so much more — written during a difficult time in Tchaikovsky's life, following the death of one young lover and a failed marriage, and dedicated to the next young lover, his own nephew, they paint a picture of the composer's life and his internal struggles. Hearing the complete set performed is a fascinating and revealing experience. This talk will also offer teaching suggestions and ideas.

Justin Gray

"Music Learning Theory as a Starting Point for an Inspiring Future for Music Education"

As a young, relatively new music teacher, I am constantly asking myself what I need to do to help my students become the most well-rounded, independent musicians they can be. Over the last century and a half, music education, and specifically piano education, has been predominantly led by the proverbial establishment of the "method book." We all learned the rudiments from these collections of exercises and preparatory through elementary level repertoire, which for the most part is grounded in sound pedagogical practices. But do they do enough? Are we giving our students enough musical skills, or even the right skills, to allow them to express themselves in the fullest way possible. I will explore these questions and more and present my case for why I believe piano education is moving in a new direction. My arguments are presented through the lens of Music Learning Theory and the research of Edwin E. Gordon and will focus on the piano series "Music Moves for Piano" by Marilyn Lowe.

Jeffrey Heisler, D.M.A., saxophone & I-Chen Yeh, D.M.A., piano Latin Influenced Dance Music

Brendan Jacklin, D.M.A.

"Examining the Butterfly Effect of Repertoire Requirements"

Young musicians face many repertoire requirements throughout their studies, with results that limit the compositional voices they are exposed to. These barriers often occur in method books, competitions, auditions, and festivals. This presentation probes these restraints and offers ideas that create greater exposure to the true breadth of classical music.

Alexis C. Lamb, Commissioned Composer "Reading Seams"

Rivers are complex bodies of water. Not only are they home to a myriad of ecosystems and species, but the direction and pacing of water flow varies and supports these ecosystems. One of the most common visual cues of changing water flow is "seams," where two currents flowing at different rates meet. Seams are an especially great place for fish to relax in the slower current while the faster current carries food sources directly to them. As an avid fisherwoman myself, one of my favorite parts of arriving at a new site is taking the time to notice, or read, the river before sending out my first cast. However, each river presents its own story and is never an open book. There is so much that we may be able to learn about these fragile ecosystems simply by taking the time to be present with them.

Pinlin Liu, Michigan State University Collegiate Chapter

"Harmonizing the Trio: Parent, Teacher, and Student in Piano Education" This presentation discusses the pivotal roles of parents, teachers, and students in the context of piano education, highlighting their interdependence in cultivating musical excellence. It not only needs the teacher's informative lessons, repertoire selection, and practice plans but also the parent's supportive role to carry on their piano practice routine. Parents can be very beneficial to a child's piano learning. This presentation will discuss the indispensable role of parents, who support a teacher's work.

Emily Peterson, M.Ed., MT-BC "Intersections of Music Therapy & Music Education: Students on the Autism Spectrum"

This presentation will be a lecture-discussion that gives an overview of the field of music therapy, consider the intersections of 1:1 music lesson and 1:1 music therapy session, and will provide time for sharing and discussion among participants. As the facilitator does not have an autism diagnosis, she defers to individuals on the spectrum who wish to share their personal experiences.

Catherine Rollin

"Unlocking Intuition & Freeing Up the Flow of Musical Expression"

In this session, Catherine will explore how teachers can inspire their students to think creatively and bring their music to life with imagination, passion, and commitment.

Mary Siciliano

"Empowering Students with Understanding, Purpose, and Excellence" This presentation will primarily focus on the pre-college student and the tools to create a teaching studio that aspires to elevate self-confidence and the artistic and pianistic possibilities of each student.

"J. S. Bach: The Ultimate Pedagogue"

Throughout his career, J.S. Bach composed music to teach students in the areas of composition and performance. This session will use various examples to demonstrate how the composer uses motives and patterns to teach technique, timing, pedaling and shaping. It will also explore how Bach's method has continued to influence composers such as Czerny, Haydn, Chopin, and Debussy.

Susan Yang, D.M.A.

"A Path to Thoughtful Programming"

We all love what is familiar, including the pieces we teach and play. But how do we step out of our comfort zone and strike a balance between familiarity and the unexplored? This presentation will share ideas on how to select repertoire and build programs that are meaningful, educational, and engaging for both students and audiences.

Zhiqian "Mona" Wu, Michigan State University Collegiate Chapter "No Pain, No Gain: Playing-Related Injuries Among Students And Practicing Musicians"

The presentation will talk about playing-related injuries among students and practicing musicians. Referring to the presenter's own experience and research, the following topics will be discussed: the general unspoken misperception of the injuries, the causes, and some specific problems one may experience from the injuries, and how to cope with the injuries/take precautions in our teaching.

Music Movement Class w/ Justin Gray "Using Laban Efforts within the Music Lesson"

Join us in a fun and interactive session where we will explore the concepts of Rudolf Laban and the Laban Movement Efforts. We will explore the relationship between our bodies and the music we listen to and how we might be able to guide our students toward a deeper connection with their own bodies and musical minds. This will be a thirty-minute movement session to get our creative juices flowing, our bodies moving, and start the day off with an energizing kick that will be sure to inspire us to learn and grow together.



MMTA 2023 Gala Concert Artist and Educator

Susan Yang

Praised as a "magnificent pianist" who "offers compelling insight" (Fanfare Magazine), Chinese American pianist **Susan Yang** maintains a multi-faceted career as a performer, pedagogue, and advocate for diversity in the arts. A recipient of the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Graduate Arts Award, she has captured top prizes at many competitions such as the National Federation of Music Clubs, International Keyboard Odyssiad, Naftzger Young Artist, and the New York Competition and Festival, among others. Yang has appeared throughout the US and Europe as a recitalist and chamber musician, as well as a concerto soloist with orchestras such as the Nashville, Ann Arbor, and Delta Symphonies. A champion of historically excluded composers, Yang has an affinity for curating programs that feature the music of women and BIPOC composers. Equally at home with the traditional canon, she released the album *DOORWAYS: Half-Remembered Music* on Blue Griffin Records, which features miniature pairings that explore the subtle connections of music across four centuries.

Yang is currently Assistant Professor of the Practice in Piano at Vanderbilt University Blair School of Music. A dedicated pedagogue, she was named the 2022 Teacher of the Year by both the Nashville Area and Tennessee Music Teachers Associations. She frequently lectures and adjudicates across the US, and her presentations have been featured at various institutions and organizations, such as the Frances Clark Center for Keyboard Pedagogy and the state and national conferences of Music Teachers National Association. Outside of her regular teaching, she has served on the artist faculty at several summer programs, including the InterHarmony International Music Festival in Acqui Terme, Italy, the University of North Carolina-Greensboro Piano Festival, and the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in Michigan.



Passionate about addressing social issues through music, Yang is co-founder and President of A Seat at the Piano (ASAP), a nonprofit organization dedicated to broadening public knowledge of marginalized composers and inspiring more thoughtful and inclusive programming. Yang often presents on topics such as incorporating social justice into the piano studio and revamping the teaching repertoire with undervalued works. A proponent of community engagement, she recently joined the Board of Directors at the Nashville Chamber Music Society. Other outreach projects she has initiated in the past include an all-student concert celebrating women's suffrage and teaching free lessons to low-income students.

Yang holds degrees from the University of Michigan, University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and Vanderbilt University. Her primary teachers include Logan Skelton, Elisabeth Pridonoff, and Amy Dorfman. Additional studies with Helen Gleason and Jerome Reed.

MMTA 2023 Gala Concert Artist and Educator Nicholas Susi



Described in The WholeNote as "an innovative musician and aggressive thinker with a gift for keyboard brilliance," **Dr. Nicholas Susi** enjoys a multifaceted career living out his deep love of music. He recognizes that Classical music has been a transformative force in his life and seeks to share its power with others through his teaching and performing.

As a teenager, Nicholas experienced a musical turning point upon discovering the music of Franz Liszt. Thrilled by the composer's virtuoso music and inspirational biography, he became a lifelong super-fan of all things Liszt. Performances and projects centering around the Hungarian composer have been a recurring theme throughout Dr. Susi's career. He has appeared as soloist in the concerti of Liszt with the Omaha Symphony Orchestra, Philharmonia of Greater Kansas City, Taneycomo Festival Orchestra, and Webster Symphony Orchestra, and he celebrated the composer's bicentennial in 2011 with a series of performances of the complete Douze études d'exécution transcendante. In 2014, Susi advanced to the semifinals of the International Franz Liszt Piano Competition (Utrecht, The Netherlands) as one of two Americans selected worldwide to participate in this prestigious competition. Most recently, he made his debut as a published author in the 2020 edition of The Journal of the American Liszt Society; in his article, Susi offers an interdisciplinary reading of Liszt's Legend no. 1 by intersecting theoretical analysis with Catholic iconography.

Dr. Susi's research has been awarded grants from such organizations as the Deutscher Akademischer Austausch Dienst (DAAD), Mu Phi Epsilon Foundation, and Legacy Foundation for the Arts. These and other grants enabled him to travel, study, and perform music across Europe; the experiences of researching Beethoven in Bonn, Debussy in Paris, and Mozart in Vienna have been central to his development as a musician and to his cosmopolitan understanding of musical styles. Other noteworthy appearances abroad include recitals at the Cité universitaire de Paris, two all-Liszt concerts for the Princess von Hohenzollern at her castle in Namedy, Germany, and concerto solos with the Wiener Residenz Orchester and Symphonie orchester der Hochschule für Musik und Tanz Köln. Stateside, Dr. Susi's career took off upon winning the 2015 National Federation of Music Clubs (NFMC) Young Artist Competition. Winners of this competition receive two years of management, which resulted in performances, masterclasses, and lectures across the country. At the same time, Susi recorded and released his debut album, Scarlatti Now, to critical acclaim; in addition to international radio airplay, the disc was featured on the prestigious Critics' Choice list (2017) of American Record Guide and was chosen as a 1st place winner of The American Prize in 2018.

Dr. Susi is Assistant Professor of Piano at the University of South Carolina. He previously taught piano and music theory at The College of St. Scholastica in Duluth, MN. He completed his doctorate at the University of Michigan, with previous studies at the University of Kansas and at the Hochschule für Musik und Tanz Köln as a two-time DAAD grantee. Primary teachers include Zena Ilyashov, Jack Winerock, Nina Tichman, and Arthur Greene.

Alexis C. Lamb (b. 1993) is a composer, percussionist, and educator whose work seeks to cultivate a connectedness to natural, historical, and societal relationships. As a composer, Lamb has collaborated with numerous ensembles and individuals, including Third Coast Percussion, Aizuri Quartet, Opera Omaha, Albany (NY) Symphony, Vera Quartet, Camilla Tassi, Contemporaneous, Emily Roller, Yale Philharmonia, and Evan Chapman.

As a percussionist, Lamb has recently found joy in improvising in a variety of natural soundscapes, listening to how the natural world responds to her human-made music. Her performance is highly influenced by the philosophies and Deep Listening practices of the late Pauline Oliveros. Lamb was also a performer from 2013-2020 with Projeto Arcomusical.

As an educator, Lamb's work runs the gamut from private lessons to curriculum development, to clinics and large classes. Her recent work has included developing the Creative Music-Making program for the Yale Music in Schools Initiative as well as serving as a Graduate Student Instructor at University of Michigan, a Teaching Fellow for the Department of Music at Yale University, and a 6-12th grade band director in Stillman Valley, Illinois.

Lamb is a recipient of a 2022 Presser Foundation Graduate Music Award and a 2021 Charles Ives Scholarship from the American Academy of Arts and Letters. She is a doctoral candidate in composition at the University of Michigan and previously earned degrees from Yale School of Music and Northern Illinois University. Sungyeon Ahn and Jiwoon Sim, Michigan State University Collegiate Chapter Derek Kealii Polischuk, D.M.A., Michigan State University, Professor of Piano / Director of Piano Pedagogy

Sungyeon Ahn is a native of South Korea. She has performed as a solo pianist and chamber musician in South Korea and the United States. Sungyeon has appeared in master classes with Christopher Harding, Ian Hopson, Hervé Billaut and Marcus Groh. Ahn received a Master of Music from the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music where she studied with Norman Krieger. Sungyeon is currently pursuing her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at Michigan State University with Derek Kealii Polischuk.

Born in South Korea, **Jiwoon Sim** is currently studying at Michigan State University in Doctoral of Musical Arts degree program in piano performance under Derek Kealii Polischuk where she is awarded a full graduate assistantship. She has performed in several masterclasses with Boris Slutsky, Logan Skelton and Xi Zhang. She was a student of Norman Krieger at Indiana University Jacobs School of Music where she earned her Master of Music degree in piano performance with scholarships. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree in piano performance from Ewha Womans University in Korea receiving scholarships and honors where she studied with Yoon-bo Jung and Yoon-Jung Song.

Derek Kealii Polischuk is professor of piano and director of piano pedagogy at the Michigan State University College of Music. Originally from San Diego, Polischuk studied with Krzysztof Brzuza before attending the University of Southern California, where he received the Doctor of Music Arts degree in Piano Performance with distinction under the tutelage of Daniel Pollack. Continue... Polischuk's 2013 solo piano recording "Terra Incognita" for the Blue Griffin label has received international critical acclaim. Colin Clark of Fanfare Magazine wrote, "The Schubert receives an excellent performance from Polischuk. Shadings are perfectly judged, and Schubert's sense of timelessness is superbly judged, finding the pianist testing the boundaries of what constitutes too much without actually transgressing. The playful F-Minor offers pure joy." Lawrence Consentino wrote, "Polischuk hits every chord with a sweet weight. Every now and then, a set of notes tumbles down like flecks of snow breezed from a crow's nest, with no evident human touch. With a warm but not ingratiating touch, he lets the music resound as if it were coming from inside your mind... 'Terra Incognita' is a thought-provoking mix of sensual pleasure and deep reflection." Of Polischuk's recording "Latin American Music for 2 Pianos" with pianist Sarkis Baltaian, James Harrington of American Record Guide wrote, "I cannot imagine anyone listening to this and not being drawn in."

An enthusiastic supporter of the education of musicians at every age, ability and background, Polischuk has been a clinician at conferences around the world, including the Music Teachers National Association, the National Group Piano and Pedagogy Conference, the Multidisciplinary Research in Music Pedagogy Conference, the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy, the DOCTRID Conference in Ireland, the ABLE Assembly at Berklee College, and at universities and conservatories across China. Polischuk serves on the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy's Committee for Teaching Students with Special Needs, the Advisory Board of the Orange County School of the Arts Pianist Program, the Board of Directors of the San Diego Musical Merit Foundation, and is President of the Michigan Music Teachers Association.

Polischuk is a founder and director of the "Celebrating the Spectrum" Piano Festival for advanced pianists on the Autism Spectrum. Polischuk's book "<u>Transformational Piano Teaching</u>," described by Dr. Alice M. Hammel of James Madison University as "a world of piano pedagogy where anyone and everyone is welcome and included in the art and joy of playing the piano" and Stewart Gordon of the University of Southern California as "a landmark in the field of piano pedagogy" is available from Oxford University Press. At Michigan State University, Polischuk has been the recipient of the Curricular Service-Learning and Civic Engagement Award, the MSU College of Music Excellence in Diversity Award, and the Teacher-Scholar Award, given in recognition of exceptional skill in teaching. Critically acclaimed as "a passionate pianist and scholar," **Svetlana Belsky** is a highly regarded performer, noted for her remarkable rapport with audiences and stylistic versatility.

Her recent albums, *Into Darkness: Piano Music of 1910-1920* (Sheridan Music Studio, 2021) and *Ferruccio Busoni: The Late Works* (Ravello, 2019) were selected by Spotify for its Best New Releases list, and received rave reviews from *Fanfare, American Record Guide, Whole Note Magazine,* and others, and has been heard on radio stations around the world.



Dr. Belsky won the 2019 American Prize in Piano Performance for her earlier recording of Stravinsky's *Rite of Spring*, which *American Record Guide* described as "an extraordinary performance" and "astounding". In commemoration of Women's History Month 2019, Dr. Belsky was awarded the *Outstanding Woman Award for Excellence in Music and Theater Arts* from the Clerk of Cook County District Court.

Dr. Belsky has toured in Europe, East Asia, Canada and throughout the United States. Her performance credits include Carnegie Recital Hall, Kiev Philharmonic Hall, Dame Myra Hess Series, live recitals on Chicago's WFMT and New York's WQXR, and guest appearances with symphony and chamber orchestras.

Belsky is considered an authority on the music, writings and pedagogical legacy of Ferruccio Busoni. Her Doctoral Thesis - an annotated translation of *Busoni as Pianist* by the Russian musicologist Grigori Kogan, was published by the University of Rochester Press in January 2010, and was nominated for the prestigious Claude V. Palisca Award by the American Musicological Society. According to one reviewer, Belsky "has some claim to call herself Ms. Bach-Busoni".

Born in Ukraine, Belsky received most of her education in the United States, first as a student of Emilio Del Rosario in Chicago, receiving her Bachelor's (summa cum laude) and Master degrees at the Peabody Conservatory in the studio of Ann Schein and her Doctorate at the Manhattan School of Music with Nina Svetlanova.

Dr. Belsky served as the Director of Piano Studies at the University of Chicago for fifteen years, and is in great demand as a lecturer, masterclass guest teacher, and competition adjudicator.



Justin Gray began his training in piano and ballet at 8 years old at His House Studios, a local music studio at his family church. From that point on Justin found every opportunity he could to study and perform as a musician and a dancer. At age 13, Justin continued his music studies under the direction of Hamilton Tescarollo at the Indiana University-Purdue University-Fort Wayne Keyboard Department and received intensive training in ballet through the Auer Academy of the Fort Wayne Ballet.

Upon graduating high school, Justin attended the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music and received a Bachelors in Ballet Performance. After three years as a professional dancer with the Fort Wayne Ballet, Justin received the Premier Young Artist Award through the Jacobs School of Music to return to Indiana University and complete a second Bachelor's Degree in Piano Performance under the guidance of Professor Emile Naoumoff.

Utilizing his skills and knowledge in multiple art forms, Justin has built a reputation of being an accomplished dance accompanist, working as a rehearsal and class pianist in such dance organizations as the Fort Wayne Ballet, Fort Wayne Civic Theatre, New American Youth Ballet, Project Ballet School, Indiana University Ballet Theater and Pre-College Program, Indianapolis Ballet, and the Grand Rapids Ballet.

Since 2015, Justin has developed a passion for teaching beginner to advanced piano students of all ages. While in Fort Wayne working as a professional dancer, Justin returned to his family church and taught piano lessons for three years at His House Studios, the place where it all began. Justin has been a resident of Grand Rapids, Michigan since April of 2020 where he has built a thriving studio of piano students. Apart from teaching, Justin also works as a pianist for the Grand Rapids Ballet and is serving as the Vice-President of the Piano Teachers' Forum of Grand Rapids.



Award-winning saxophonist **Jeffrey Heisler** serves as Associate Professor of Saxophone at Oakland University and soprano saxophonist with the Assembly Quartet. Dr. Heisler holds degrees from Bowling Green State University (DMA, MM) and Central Michigan University (BME).

Among Heisler's accomplishments are a Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition Gold Medal, prizes in the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) Chamber Music and Young Artist Competitions, and honors as "Outstanding Classical Soloist" in Downbeat Magazine.

He has concertized throughout the world, including performances with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Michigan Opera Theatre, Toledo Symphony, Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra, and Benny Goodman Orchestra.

A native of Kaohsiung, Taiwan, award-winning pianist **I-Chen Yeh** enjoys an international career as a solo and collaborative performer. A performer devoted to contemporary music, Yeh's solo and collaborative performances strive to highlight a new and exciting repertory. Her passion for new music has led to collaborations with notable composers such as Pulitzer Prize winners Steven Stucky and Ellen Taaffe Zwilich. In addition she has commissioned and premiered works for solo piano and other chamber music by David Rakowski, Marc Mellits, Greg Sandow, Andres Carrizo, Timothy Stulman, David Gillingham, Andrea Reinkemeyer, Anthony Donofrio, and Jeff Weston.

Yeh has appeared at many world renowned music festivals, including the Aspen Music Festival, the Bowdoin Music Festival, Bowling Green State University's New Music and Art Festivals, Eastern Music Festival, the Internationale Wiener Musik Seminar, Threshold Electroacoustic Festival, and the Ball State University New Music Festival. Recent concert appearances include performances at (le) poisson rouge (NYC), the Interlochen Center for the Arts, the Yamaha Performing Artist Center (Taipei, Taiwan), the Taiwan National Concert Hall, and many Universities and Conservatories throughout the United States.

Yeh holds degrees from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music (BM), the Eastman School of Music (MM), and Bowling Green State University (DMA). Her primary teachers include Laura Melton, Angela Cheng, and Thomas Schumacher. She has also performed in master-classes led by internationally renowned pianists such as Stephen Hough, Nelita True, Robert Levin, John Perry, and James Giles. Yeh is an active member of Music Teachers National Association (MTNA). Dr. Yeh is on the piano faculty at Oakland University (MI).



Canadian-American pianist, educator, and lecturer, **Brendan Jacklin** is dedicated to sharing new sounds and ideas through his music. He has premiered over 50 new works for both solo piano and chamber ensembles, and has commissioned works from composers across the United States and Canada.

A special interest of his is performing interdisciplinary and multimedia music, including pairing music with electronics, video, poetry, and dance. 

All of the many facets of Catherine's work emanate from her central passion for teaching.

Catherine has received numerous commissions from state and local associations as well as Clavier Magazine and from the Music Teacher National Association. (MTNA) . In 2018 her MTNA commissioned trio for flute, alto saxophone and piano, "Suite Detroit" was featured at the MTNA Conference in Orlando, FL.. Catherine has been honored to have her works featured on the National Federation of Music (NFMC)Clubs Festival Bulletin in the solo, duet, concerto, one hand and Patriotic categories. She continued her training at the Juilliard School, where she received B.M. and M.M. degrees under the tutelage of Robert McDonald. In the fall 2011 Tian completed a D.M.A. in Piano

Performance and Literature with a minor in Chamber Music and Accompanying at the Eastman School of Music where she was a student of (and served as teaching assistant to) Nelita True.

Dr. Tian maintains a busy performance schedule in the U.S and abroad. Solo appearances have included music festivals such as Piano Texas, the Gilmore Festival, and Summer Courses with Arie Vardi (Germany). Recent concerto appearances included the Windsor Symphony and the Idyllwild Chamber Orchestra. As a member of the Studzinsky Trio, she has recently performed in the U.S., China, and Korea.

As a soloist, Salazar was the winner of the Arizona State University (ASU) concerto competition where he was a featured soloist with the ASU Wind Ensemble and recently received 2nd place at the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) Young Artist Competition. It was success in an MTNA event that first drew **Dr. Silvia Roedere**r to a career in music: in the early 70s as a high school sophomore, she represented the state of Colorado in the regional competition in Columbia, MO. Later in grad school in LA, she entered her students in the California MTA competitions, and in Michigan, has continued to benefit from the expertise and camaraderie of wonderful colleagues in MMTA. Professional highlights within the organization include presentations at the MTNA conferences in NYC and Denver, and mentoring the WMU student chapter that presented a session in the Salt Lake City MTNA conference. She has been happy to chair the MMTA Commissioned Composer program for 10 years.

Silvia Roederer was born and raised in Buenos Aires, Argentina. When she was 7 years old, her family emigrated to Denver, Colorado, where her musical growth was cultivated by Cornelia Vertenstein. She continued her training at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY (B.M.) with David Burge, and earned graduate degrees at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles (M.M., D.M.A.) with John Perry.

Silvia and her husband Leslie Tung moved to Kalamazoo, MI from Los Angeles when he was invited to join the music faculty at Kalamazoo College. New directions since retiring from full-time teaching include volunteer tutoring in a local elementary school, sponsoring an immigrant family from Rwanda, service trips to Puerto Rico and Guatemala,camping in a converted hybrid van, training for triathlons, traveling to visit family, and reconnecting with the many wonderful human beings whom she has had the privilege to teach.

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
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
